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PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

Last year, we reviewed our Strategic Plan with input from staff, students, and our wider community. Reflecting this collective voice, we finalised our vision: to provide an inspiring, holistic learning experience so students leave school with choices, confidence, and a sense of purpose. Our purpose at CHS is to develop our learning community to best prepare students for life beyond school.

This year, we have focused on bringing the Strategic Plan to life, ensuring Cambridge High School is a great environment for all of us to learn and continue to develop. Learning is synonymous with growth and must be a core part of everything we do if we are to prepare students for life beyond school. It is obvious that learning happens in the classroom, but it is not isolated to inside those four walls. The learning from co-curricular activities, school trips and events, our interactions with others, and the mistakes we make are also very good examples of learning in our school community. These many and varied opportunities make up the fabric of CHS and we are proud that our students leave school with choices, confidence, and a sense of purpose.

During the year, we have reinforced this message via assemblies and other opportunities, and I would like to summarise the main themes that we have covered - highlighting the important features of a strong learning community.

The importance of dreams, goals, and a desire to improve ourselves.

During Te Wiki o Te Reo Maaori (Maaori Language Week) a colleague shared this adage from Princess Te Puea, a leader in the Kiingitanga movement in the early 20th century:

Mehemea ka moemoaa ahau ko ahau anake, mehemea ka moemoeaa e taatou ka taea e taatou.

If I dream alone, I alone will achieve that dream. If we all dream together, we all will benefit from this dream.

Sharing dreams not only enables us to share the goals that will help us realise our dreams, but it also encourages others to explore more of what is possible. In setting our goals and dreams, we draw inspiration from each other and our experiences. All of us can point to individuals in our past who have influenced us, sharing their dreams and passions and opening our minds to more of what is possible. Don't underestimate how much of an impact your dreams, goals, and success have on others — no matter which stage of life you are in. Every year, we speak to students about what inspires them. They acknowledge the widest range of people, including other students, their parents, teachers, and coaches.

The importance of courage and seeing CHS as the time to try.

As a learner, you need to be prepared to step out of your comfort zone, make mistakes, and receive feedback. That takes courage - particularly as a teenager in a secondary school in New Zealand where it can, at times, be countercultural to try your best. This theme of courage was echoed in the Tokyo Olympics 2020. The Olympics offers us much more just the sport; they produce fantastic stories. These stories illustrate what it means to be human: how we connect with and support others, bounce back from difficulties, cope with loss, and celebrate our wins. Throughout the Olympics, we see stories of courage. The courage to start, to try to be your best, to learn from mistakes, to pick yourself up, and to try again.

During this time, while watching outstanding athletes achieving remarkable feats, I try to remember that they all started somewhere. They were once novices starting at the beginning, seeking advice, and making many mistakes. As they progressed, they experienced loss in competitions and became stronger for that experience. As they committed to their own goals and dreams, they found the strength to endure difficult times and the courage to try again and again. A wonderful example of this is found in the story of Emma Twigg, claiming gold in her fourth Olympics. Having missed medalling by the slimmest of margins in 2012 and 2016, she then found the courage needed to build her self-belief and have another go. The resulting gold-medal race was incredible.

These results are things that we can easily use as headlines, celebrating the super-heroic wins as if they were miraculous. But these wins do not just happen, and the outcome is never certain. What is certain is that you will never know what you can achieve if you don't try. At CHS, we have a very supportive space with many opportunities for students and with experts ready to help get us there. Now is the ideal time to be courageous in your learning. Learn how to take feedback, experience how to win and how to lose, and start to surround yourself with people who believe in you and your ability to succeed.





The importance of resilience, because when things don't go well, learning is at its greatest.

Learning doesn't happen in isolation. It occurs when we work with others, when we try something and get it wrong, or when we get stuck and cannot find a way forward. It comes when we get things right, as well. This is all strengthened by an ability to bounce back from mistakes and to give and receive feedback. Often, it is easier said than done, but it is good for us to make mistakes - especially in a supportive environment. Through these mistakes, we learn a lot about ourselves: how to bounce back, how to ask for help, and how to look for a different perspective.

We don't intentionally make mistakes. They can come as a surprise or as something out of our control, and that can be particularly stressful. In these situations, it is important that we talk to someone. Others can help us develop a fresh perspective or find a fix for our situation, because the way we are seeing the problem can be limited and reflect our bad headspace. Going through difficult times with the support of others builds our resilience. This then strengthens our ability to cope with more challenges and setbacks in the future as we continue to develop.

The importance of belonging and reaching out for support.

Neuroscience informs us of the importance of belonging and feeling connected to a place and each other. Belonging ensures that we feel supported, creating an environment where we feel ready to learn from our experiences. And we are not alone in prioritising the sense of connection and belonging. During last year's lockdown, The University of Waikato learnt the impact that connecting with their students had on individual student success and engagement. They made personal contact with every student during lockdown to see how they were managing, and this kept the students more involved and motivated in their studies. They now prioritise the support and connection for students, taking proactive steps to build connections within student groups.

CHS is a supportive learning environment where students, staff, and the community come together to learn and help others learn. We have a culture that reinforces a sense of belonging and ensures that, collectively, we can best prepare students for life beyond school. It is normal to need support at certain points in our lives. What we struggle with in our New Zealand culture is making this need ok and talking about it. We need to remind ourselves that it is expected that we will have challenges and it is normal to need help and input from others to manage these challenges. We know we have a very supportive environment at Cambridge High School and we continue to help people learn how, when, and from whom we can get the support we need.

The importance of taking ownership of our outcomes and well-being

Much is currently made of the importance of our well-being. This is fantastic, as there is now a collective awareness of what enhances our own well-being. Psychologist Nigel Latta ran professional development for us on one of the Teacher Only Days and one of his messages was this: Now that we are aware of what works for our well-being, we need to take ownership of it. He references the Stoics (from Athens in the Third Century BCE), who developed a philosophy that was based on accepting the moment as it presents itself. Or, put another way, things are the way they are. Things are neither inherently good nor bad. You can control some things, but not everything. Often, we need others to help us understand the difference between what we can control and what we can't. When we know the difference, we can find a way to take back control over the things that matter to us. As we become aware of what enhances our well-being, we need to do more of that thing. Examples of this are the research-led Mental Health Foundation's approach – the Five Ways to Well-being: connect, give, take notice, keep learning, be active (https:// mentalhealth.org.nz/five-ways-to-wellbeing). Mason Durie provides a Te Whare Tapa Whaa model built on physical, spiritual, family, and mental health (https://www.health.govt. nz/our-work/populations/maori-health/maori- health-models/ maori-health-models-te-whare-tapa-wha).

I think it is dangerous to assume that well-being is about creating a challenge- or problem-free existence for ourselves. Life is full of challenge and there is learning, strengthening, and growth that come from facing up to a challenge and finding a way through the difficulty. For example, if we explore that cliché of finding public speaking difficult - or even terrifying - we can try to look at it differently. Can you remember that you are learner? No one expects you to be perfect and others want to see you learn and become stronger at speaking. Can you be better prepared? Can you get input from others? It is important to keep reviewing how we approach problems and difficult situations, reminding ourselves to focus on what is it we can take control over and do something about it.

I want to finish with an acknowledgement of our students, parents, and staff for the many ways you have contributed to an outstanding year. The high quality of events and performances delivered through the passion from our school community is remarkable and certainly makes for an incredible schooling experience. Thank you for the many ways you have contributed to make this such a successful year. Thank you for enabling CHS to offer a rich learning experience of which we can all be very proud.







2021 MATHEMATICS

The Mathematics Faculty of Cambridge High School created an opportunity for students to use their knowledge in various Math competitions this year. We kicked off our competition year with 48 Year 9-11 students participating in the Junior Otago Maths Competition. This competition had two rounds – the first one online and the second a challenging written round. Out of 140 schools across New Zealand, with 4500 students in round one and 1600 students in round two, we had 20 students achieving a Merit and one student, Bronwen Rees-Jones, achieving a magnificent Distinction (placing in the top 15% of her year group).



Cambridge's participation continued with 36 students from Year 9-13 accepting the challenge to compete in the Australian Maths Competition (AMC). We created a space for these students in our library, where they had 75 minutes to complete 25 multiple-choice questions and five whole-number questions. We haven't received the results yet, but students gave their best efforts and we expect good things.



COMPETITIONS



Our last competition for the year was the WaiMaths, held at Fairfield College. Again, we had three outstanding teams representing our school. Bronwen Rees-Jones, Maia Kervin, and Hannah Goodwin represented the Year 9s and Alisha Yang, Luke Huggins, and Anna Westlake represented the Year 10s. Our Year 11 team of Aidan Dobson, Ellessa Sansom, and Neve Keightley had some slick competition and missed the top three by a small margin. We didn't place, but we did have a fantastic time solving problems against time.



We are proud of all the students who took the challenge to put their knowledge to the test. We hope to see you again next year!




We would like to finish by giving a big "Ngaa mihi" to all the students we have had in our subject area this year. Your perseverance, resilience, and adaptability has been appreciated.

GEOGRAPHY

After last year's interruption to most field trips, it was nice to be back on the bus - bags packed, equipment ready, and headed off to our favourite field trip locations. The Year 11/10 EXT classes were back in Napier investigating viticultural techniques at Craggy Range. Despite viticulture as the focus, there was never a doubt that the main highlight was the Scary Night Tour at the Napier Prison! This trip exposed our students to a lecture at EIT (Eastern Institute of Technology), which teaches them what Tertiary study will be like. They also went to Cellar Door to look at the end products of wine sales and tourism while gathering data at Craggy's world famous vineyard.





The Year 12s were back to the top of Pukeatua Summit on Mount Maungatautari. The students gathered data on vegetation, climate, and soil to analyse the impact of rising altitude.

The Year 13s headed off to Waihi Beach. Here, they paid their respects to Kaelah Marlow before carrying our research along the 9km Tombolo. Staying at the surf club, we enjoyed the beautiful surrounds, the surf, and the beach while eating our fish and chips on the deck.

HISTORY

The History trip to Rangiriri on the 1st of June was fascinating. We got to walk around the actual battle site! The experience was hosted by the Rangiriri Historical Trust, who taught us about the battle and the aftermath of it from a Maaori perspective. This gave us a new understanding as the event became more real.

We were in the middle of a History Internal about an historical event that is signifiacant to New Zealanders. This trip gave us sources of how the battle of Rangiriri still effects people to this day.

On the 20th of Nomember 1863, General Duncan Cameron led a frontal assault on the paa of Rangiriri. Unknown to them, Rangiriri was a complex contruction of parapets and entrenchments with concealed pit rifles either side of the site preventing any one from attacking from the sides. Not only that, but the paa site was surrounded by swampy marsh land.

The General invaded because the Kiingitanga were veiwed as a threat to the British authority in New Zealand. Their first attack failed miserably and incurred heavy casualties. That night, many of the Maaori fighters - including women and children - fled out the back across Lake Kopuera (Those Who Were Shot). While crossing, British sailors fired at the fleeing Maaori.







The next day a dawn, the Maaori hoisted a white flag as a sign of negotiatiom. The British assumed it was a sign of surreneder and infiltrated the paa, taking 180 prisoners to Auckland. Many historians have different veiws on why the Maaori raised the white flag. Some historians say that the British raised a white flag and the Maaori raised one in response as an agreement for a truce and negotiation. During our time at the paa site of Rangiriri, we got to take photos to aid us with our Internal. It was very interesting to hear a different view other than books and the internet. Thank you to the Rangiriri Historic Trust for hosting the trip and to Mr. McNair and Mrs. Ball for their supervision.

EXT 4

Running for its 8th year now, the Extension 4 class is a class for students who have completed NCEA subjects a year early, resulting in an opportunity to broaden their learning. No other school offers such an opportunity for its students and it would be fair to say its reputation is envious and something CHS can be proud of.

The goals of the EXT 4 course are based on four pillars – Academic Excellence, Personal Growth, Becoming Life Ready and Community Involvement. These four concepts have been the main focus of our work this year, with students coming up with many creative ways to make the most of their time in the class. Through volunteering, supporting local schools, taking up new hobbies, prepping for university and extending themselves through scholarship exams and university papers, this unique group of students achieved a huge amount and should be very proud of their accomplishments.

2021 saw the Extension 4 class take on perhaps the most ambitious challenge yet. Early in the year, they were approached by our local rest home - Resthaven. Resthaven is Cambridge's only non-profit rest home, and it provides for an important sector of our community. The Resthaven board put forward their need for a new van to aid the elderly who reside at the rest home, and asked if the class would be able to perhaps make a small contribution to the funding of this van. However, the students felt they had a lot more to give, and so they set their goal of raising \$70,000 to purchase a new van for the rest home, in hopes that it would help transport the residents to appointments and events around town. The class recognised the need for the older generations to still be active in the community, and therefore felt that providing a van was something that would benefit not only the Resthaven residents, but the town of Cambridge as a whole. From this vision, the ResthaVAN campaign emerged, with the students creating a long term plan which would hopefully result in the successful fundraising of \$70,000 and the purchase of a brand new van for their local rest home.

The class created a social media presence, including a Give A Little page, formed connections with the residents of the rest home, provided events for the residents including a Bingo Night and a Dance Showcase, as well as hosting many events and fundraisers to raise money for the van. One of the largest fundraising events that occurred was a town-wide dress-up day, where local businesses all over Cambridge participated in a 'Thrifty-Fifties' themed day to raise money for the ResthaVAN project. After these efforts, the class was approached by C&R, a local business, who had seen our work and wanted to meet with the class. C&R saw our vision and wanted to support the campaign in any way possible to ensure the project was successful. It was the support from C&R and the local community, paired with the initiative of this group of students, that resulted in the successful purchase of a van which was presented to Resthaven, fully decked out and ready to use.

We would like to thank everyone in the community for seeing our vision and aiding us in achieving this goal and we can't wait to see the residents getting out and about in our community. We would also, as many of us move away for Tertiary study extend our love and thanks to the residents for spending time with us this year and we hope to catch up with you if an opportunity arises.

SCIENCE

2021 continued to bring complexities in science learning at Cambridge High School with the ongoing effect of a global pandemic. Science teaching and learning went ahead mostly, with trips and practical work continuing for most of the year. Our students persevered through another extended lockdown and engaged with science through quality online courses and regular teams meetings with their teachers.

Luckily many of our trips were able to go ahead with the Level 3 Physics trip to Rainbow's End bringing a fun context to senior mechanics principles. News flash: Riding the rollercoaster is a great way to learn about Physics! The Level 2 Biologists were also able to visit, and carry out fieldwork, at our local mainland island ecological reserve, Sanctuary Mountain in Maungatautari. This trip is always a highlight of the year, with students gathering bird count data across a range of our native bird species.







Junior scientists enjoyed the opportunities to do practical work across the fields of Physics, Biology and Chemistry, including exploring the world through microscopes, testing for hydrogen gas with pop tests and zapping one another with our van der graaf generator. Students explored new technologies being used by farms, they got to look at how farmers run their businesses and how the wide range of jobs in farming all come together in the industry.

2021 also shaped up to be an excellent year academically, with a variety of students preparing for the Level 3 Scholarship examinations across all the Sciences. The Extension Plus students pursued their passion projects, exploring how Science connects with the world.







An exciting moment in the year was to see S Block finally be demolished, this is a significant step forward in the journey towards our new learning space.


