Cambridge District High School opened on the Clare St premises with 82 pupils, 2 classes and a science lab

Queen Elizabeth visited Cambridge and were presented to our Head Students. The Head Student wrote "We have treasured memories of the dashing and friendly Duke of Edinburgh and our charming gracious Queen".

PRINCIPAL'S

Kia ora koutou,

In writing this I realised that I started at CHS in the same year as our Year 13s - 2019. I remember meeting a much smaller quieter Ben Bonetti and his family at the whaanau welcome evening. I think we were both pretty excited about the next few years although neither of us could have seen what was around the corner. Only 13 months after starting we were in the middle of a global pandemic, the effects of which were going to have a significant impact on three of the last five years of our experience of school life. I did not want to go there, mentioning COVID again in a year when it finally became less of a thing, but it was significant and a challenge for all of us. I want to acknowledge that and celebrate all that we have achieved despite the difficulties. Some of the highlights from this year have roots in the strength and resilience displayed by our students, staff and our community over the past few years.

We hosted international students throughout the COVID years as they were not able to return home. The resilience of these students and the care of their homestays was remarkable – no wonder international students love studying and living in Cambridge so much. And we love the culture and energy they bring with them. We recently held our international food festival. This is an opportunity for our students to showcase their culture through the best way possible – their favourite dishes. It was great to see our hall full of students trying new food, enjoying music and each other's company.

In Arts and Sports our students and staff have shown great reserve and determination. maintaining good participation rates, bouncing back in the season or competitions, and achieving national and regional success. This success really has been a community effort with a large quantity of volunteers and supporters keeping our students active and involved as much as was possible in the past few years. We know what it means to work hard, bounce back, continue improving and succeed. An example of this was when the spectators celebrated the 1st XV girls rugby win with a stirring performance of the school haka, recognising the teams' success after years of development.


ADDRESS

We launched our new house system in 2020 to help foster a greater sense of belonging at Cambridge High School and establish deeper connection with Cambridge. That has seen a strengthening of our form class system, greater student agency and a wider range of activities and involvement for our students. Events like the successful school haka competition this year showed how far our house system has come and the passion that students have for their house. We have also increased the quantity of leadership roles and the potential for our students to contribute to CHS. We focused on the development of our student leaders and building a network of student leaders throughout the region. As a result, we see a high-guality contribution in our school community and beyond from our students. Strong leadership was displayed in moments such as our students using their voice to protest against the impact that industrial action was having on their education. Seeing Anna Jago being interviewed by Lisa Owen on RadioNZ was a big highlight and came as a result of our students writing to the government. They presented a petition and urged them to do more to recognise the value of teaching and resolve the collective bargaining.

And there is so much more to celebrate despite, or perhaps even because of, the challenges we have endured. To quote the Crowded House song Everything is good for you "If it doesn't kill you. Everything is good for you". We have learnt more of what we are capable of achieving and realised just how significant our potential is. I hope that, in time, you will be able to look back on this period and realise these years have helped make you stronger, ready for whatever comes next.







LIBRARY 50TH BIRTHDAY

In 1973 the G N Marshall Library was officially opened, Cambridge District High School moved to the current site from Middle Schools site in Clare St in 1961 and after 12 years of beseeching the Department of Education, permission and funding were granted to build the current library at Cambridge High School.

This year we celebrated 50 years of this building providing books for reading, spaces for reflection, articles for researching and a hub for our students to be involved in a myriad of other school wide activities.

It was also the opportunity we needed to officially open our G N Marshall Archives- a dedicated space to house all our taonga, school year books and photos, and historical documents that tell the story of Cambridge High School. We displayed our many wonderful artifacts and the documents we have had restored and digitised.

Our guests included the daughter of G N Marshall who was Principal of this school in 1962 and was the driver of ensuring a dedicated library space was built, the library was named after him on his retirement. Mr Dennis Finn officially opened our G N Marshall Archives room, he was a past commissioner of the school and re-opened our library after it was shut down for a period time in more turbulent years in the early 2000's. However, our most important guests were all the students from as far back as the 1950s who came back into the school and remembered together their school years and the learning, sports, and shenanigans they got up to together. It was a huge honour to host this event, celebrate our library and provide an opportunity for our past students to share with us their stories and relive their schooling days together.

Owl Farm



A crisp winters day greeted students from 14 classes of Year 10 Science as they hopped off buses at Owl Farm on June 21st. Despite some initial confusion over the lack of owls, students quickly organised themselves into groups to begin rotating through presentations from a wonderful group of local experts.

Representatives from WestPac Agribusiness division took students through an introduction to farm and business finances. Students got to practice their numeracy skills while calculating the value of a dairy herd and making sense of a profit and loss statement.

Peter Briston of Cambridge Veterinary Services brought along a great range of equipment, including a portable ultrasound machine that students used to examine a model uterus to see the objects hidden inside. His discussion of the health care and technology used to keep dairy herds healthy was very well received. Students enjoyed saying hello to the new-born calves that had just come into the shed.

Halter Technologies also came along to share how they are working with farmers to introduce labour saving technology onto farms that also has significant herd management benefits. Many a student enjoyed roleplaying as a dairy cow, following the prompts of the Halter to guide them in the desired direction. Markus Woutersen also made several cameo appearances as a poorly behaved dairy cow, adding to his already significant contribution in the organisation of this event.

Jo Sheridan of Owl Farm was not only instrumental



in organising this day, she also took groups through a presentation that explored ideas around pasture and soil management. Students who thought "grass is grass" came away with a much better understanding of pasture composition and how management practices can be used to minimise nutrient leeching and land degradation.

Fonterra sent along an electric milk tanker as the centre piece of their presentation on continual improvement and innovation in logistics and the agriculture industry. They also shared the scale of their operation and the ongoing commitment of Fonterra to reduce their carbon footprint. The much loved samples of Primo Flavoured milk made them the peoples choice for many students.

The goal of the day was to allow students an opportunity to explore aspects of the agricultural sector that they may not have considered previously. Building their awareness of the range of opportunities that are available to them and how the learning they do in class is part of building skills and capabilities that can take them anywhere in their future. Huge thanks go out to all of our volunteer presenters and particularly to Jo and Markus who made this event possible.



Shakespeare Festival 2023



Shakespeare is alive at Cambridge High School again. We had four student directed scenes compete in the Waikato regional Shakespeare Festival held at Te Awamutu College in Term 1. Hamilton Kay and Jesse Tweddle blew the crowd away with the high energy and powerful scene they performed from Measure for Measure. They went on to take out the competition and take the placing for 5 minute scene - taking them down to Wellington to compete at the National Festival. Hamilton and Jesse continued with their high level of success, winning the award for Actors who showed the strongest and most truthful connection between them award, donated by Toi Whakaari New Zealand Drama School. Hamilton Kay went on to win Outstanding delivery of the Text award donated by Glenda Pearce. Hamilton also received an award for being a Student director and getting a piece into the National Festival. Judge Robyn Malcom said "You worked incredibly well together; the intellectual debate was given emotional heat by your physicalities. You listened, responded and affected each other. You used the space beautifully and actions like smoothing out the table tell us so much. Its funny that even though Shakespeare is all about language, according to scientists we communicate only 6% through language." Hamilton Kay has since gone on to be selected for NSSP (National Schools Shakespeare Production), a week long intensive course with a production at the end. The highest of accolades.

Trees For Survival

The fourth of May was a beautiful sunny day after weeks of excessive rain. Four of the Year 9 classes took advantage of the sunshine to head out to Maungatautari and protect a local stream with native plantings. They were accompanied by their science teachers, Assistant Principals Mr Kuijpers and Mrs Bartch, and Kathryn Bourne from Trees for Survival.

The plants had been provided by the Trees for Survival Trust and raised from seedlings here at Cambridge High School. The students worked in two groups across the day to plant over 700 seedlings. This massive effort will have a positive impact on the health of this local stream and ultimately Lake Karapiro where the stream joins the Waikato River.

- Planting along waterways improves water quality by
- Stabilising stream banks to improve water clarity
- Increasing shade to reduce water temperature and increase dissolved oxygen levels
- Filtering excess nutrients out of ground water and runoff before it reaches waterways

The Year 9 students were able to link their planting efforts to the environmental science work they cover in their classes. They also had an opportunity to take a break from the planting and look at the seedlings that had been planted further upstream by the Year 9 students of 2022. It was great to see how well established the plants were after just one year. We got to enjoy the native birds including tui and piwakawaka that checked out the progress regularly throughout the day and seemed to approve of the plants that will add to the natural environment as they mature.

Huge thanks goes to the Risi family for allowing us to come and explore their stream and add to the native plantings in the Maungatautari area. We had a great and muddy time.










Science

2023 was a great year for our science programmes at Cambridge High School. Ongoing improvements to our junior science programmes have resulted in more practical work and engaging contexts that connect science to the real world. This was further enhanced with connections to our communities through riparian tree planting and the annual Year 10 Owl Farm visit where students had the opportunity to experience the wide range of career pathways connected to our agricultural sector, along with some of the emerging technologies being trialed in the sector. This was all made possible by the Smart Waikato Secondary Schools Employment Partnerships programme. In class our junior scientists explored the world through microscopes, tested for hydrogen gas with pop tests and zapped one another with our Van der Graaf generator (all in the name of science learning).

The General Science course has been extended through to Year 13, alongside Physics, Biology, and Chemistry. Our General Science students have been able to explore the more practical aspects of science, building bottle rockets and launching them on the field in Term 2, with the record being over 80m!





Our Year 12 biologists were able to resume their yearly ecological fieldtrip to Sanctuary Mountain – Maungatautari to explore sustainability and pest control. Some of our chemistry students attended the Chemistry Competition held at the University of Waikato and got to experience chemistry in a working research lab. Our senior physicists got accelerated at the Skyline Luge in Rotorua and spun upside down at Rainbows End.

2023 has shaped up to be an excellent year academically, with a variety of students preparing for the Level 3 scholarship examinations. We have also seen the impressive efforts of the junior plus class producing passion project inquiries that explored science ideas across multiple learning areas. A true example of the 21st Century Skills we aim to develop in our faculty.

GEOGRAPHY

Another group of amazing young people opted in to taking Geography. Trips went off without being affected by weather or pandemics. Our learning across all three-year levels covers a tropical theme in which students investigate tropical cyclones, rainforests and reefs. Our Level 1 geographers gathered data from Maungatautari Maunga, our Level 2 students investigated land uses in Mount Maunganui and the Year 13 researched the coastal processes operating at Waihi Beach.



Samoa Trip



Year 13 Geo was a hit this year, starting off with our 2-day trip to Waihi Beach. The weather was lovely, and we spent the day measuring waves, taking photos and throwing lemons. Finishing it off with takeaways at the Waihi Beach Surf Club. A highlight of the year was the trip to Samoa. The first overseas trip since COVID and a very successful one. We swam at the Sauniatu Waterfall and snorkelled in the To Sua Trench & Piula Cave Pools' crystal-clear waters. We ate amazing food at a traditional cultural show and met some lovely people both in the resort and in the main town of Apia. Soaking up every single bit of sun and warm weather before going back to the cold winter in NZ. It was an incredible trip that is recommended to anybody lucky enough to get this opportunity.

The outstanding physical products created by students through design, refinement, and then realisation of individual ideas are the visible objects that are seen leaving the building but all students can attest to the incredible Technological Process learning that is involved as well.

The success of an integrated approach to teaching was evident in remarkable outcomes by the students throughout a very successful 2023.

A few of the outcomes and successes from our faculty

 MTW/Carpentry – Students are working on curved timber lamination in junior and senior projects to build on skills, and individualised specialism projects including electric guitars, 60's "space age" coffee tables and folding chairs.
Textiles – Students have had great success and engagement with all projects, making pj shorts, 3D teddy bears, learning about sustainable fashion and designing their own personal projects. This year we have had very high success rates and NCEA pass results.

-Food Technology - Students have participated in creating many amazing dishes and pulling off incredible events for staff and whānau. At the Culinary Fare senior students came away with gold and bronze awards. In the food room students hosted pasta, Chinese and sandwhich themed food nights and provided food for the Pink Ribbon bake sale and the Year 8 open night.

-MTE/Engineering – Students are creating excellent quality work with their gear knobs, downhill racers and sling-a-cars. Across the different classes students are building new skills and discovering the limitations and potential of different materials. Testing out student-designed bridges was a major highlight.

 Design and VIsual Communication – Students have enjoyed working on design narratives from the Hamilton Gardens at Year 10 and 11, and within our own school designing shelters that represent our stories. Senior levels are working on incredible projects in product and spatial design including cafes, visitor centres, watches and speakers. Students learn to design functional and meaningful outcomes that take inspiration from a variety of sources, from the Huka Falls to a DeLorean car.

- Digital Technologies – Where binary magic unfolds, allowing for some serious digital exploration! Junior-level students craft engaging movie posters using Adobe Photoshop, leveraging visual elements to design HTML websites. They delve into Python and C# coding, conquer robot control, and culminate their year mastering microprocessors and stepper motors for precision mechatronic control. Seniors have managed to take this up a notch and tackle real world problems with awesome bespoke digital solutions.

Level 2 - Tourism hits Rotorua!

Our aim for this trip was to explore different work roles within our regenerated Tourism sector and understand different aspects of New Zealand tourism. Students gained insight on tourism businesses and managed to play tourist for the day discovering the needs of both international and domestic customers.

The day commenced with a vibrant industry talk from the knowledgeable staff at Velocity Valley Adrenaline Park. We then put our brave pants on and joined in some of the hair-raising activities. While the pumping jet boat ride had many of us squealing and throwing our hands in the air, it was the Swoop that was the activity of choice for those that could stomach the 40-metre drop!

Throughout the morning I saw the students interacting, laughing, and supporting each other. A particularly lovely moment had our Aakonga gather in a large group to cheer on an international student who was returning home soon. They recorded his daring Swoop, so he was able to share his experience back home in Japan. Getting out of the classroom is such an organic way to have students build relationships through their experiences together.

Finally, it was time to hit the Skyline slopes of Mount Ngongotaha. Students got to enjoy the majestic lake views as they rode the gondola to the top.
